#### Introduction

LEADER: This prayer service is a celebration of all women and the contributions they continue to make in our communities, workplaces, and at home, as workers, mothers, wives, daughters, sisters, citizens, caregivers, laborers, teachers, volunteers, leaders and lawmakers, and in all capacities in which they serve. We recall the principles of Catholic Social Teaching that compel us to be aware of the Life and Dignity of the Human Person, the Call to Family, Community, and Participation, the Option for the Poor, and the Rights and Responsibilities of every human being. As we begin this prayer service, please put yourself in a prayerful place, in the presence of the Lord, with a keen awareness of women as beings created in God's image. Take time to reflect on your experiences as a woman, and/or your interactions with women, and especially consider those women most dear to you in your own life.

(Pause to allow time for reflection.)

#### **Justice Reflections**

**LEADER:** We reaffirm the fundamental equality of women and men who, created in the image of God, "all are called to participate in the same divine beatitude: all therefore enjoy an equal dignity." Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1934

READER 1: "When women are able fully to share their gifts with the whole community, the very way in which society understands and organizes itself is improved, and comes to reflect in a more comprehensive manner the substantial unity of the human family. Here we see the most important condition for the consolidation of authentic peace. The growing presence of women in social, economic and political life at the local, national and international levels is thus a very positive development. Women have a full right to become actively involved in all areas of public life, and this right must be affirmed and guaranteed, also, where necessary, through appropriate legislation." Pope John Paul II, World Day of Peace Message, 1995, #9

**READER 2:** "Women have the right to insist that their dignity be respected. At the same time, they have the duty to work for the promotion of the dignity of all persons, men as well as women." Pope John Paul II, World Day of Peace Message, 1995, #11

**READER 1:** "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28

READER 2: "Mary, Queen of Peace, is close to the women of our day because of her embracing motherhood, her example of openness to others' needs and her witness of suffering. Mary lived with a deep sense of responsibility the plan which God willed to carry out in her for the salvation of all humanity. When she was made aware of the miracle which God had worked in her by making her the Mother of his Incarnate Son, her first thought was to visit her elderly kinswoman Elizabeth in order to help her. That meeting gave Mary the chance to express, in the marvelous canticle of the Magnificat (Lk 1:46-55), her gratitude to God who, with her and through her, had begun a new creation, a new history." READER 1: "We implore the Most Holy Virgin Mary to sustain those men and women who, in the service of life, have committed themselves to building peace. With her help, may they bear witness before all people, especially those who live in darkness and suffering and who hunger and thirst for justice, to the loving presence of the God of peace." (Each of the following intentions should be read thoughtfully by the prayer leader.)

**LEADER:** Our response is: Mary of Nazareth, pray for us.

- 1. As Pope Benedict XVI prayed in his special intention for month of April, 2006: That the individual, social and political rights of women may be respected in every nation. We pray ...
- 2. For an end to sexism, and an increase in our critical thinking so that we may examine with an open mind the changes needed in private and public life. We pray ...
- 3. For an end to abuse and domestic violence and the resurgence of sustainable, healthy relationships between men and women, especially in the homes where children are at risk. We pray ...
- 4. For access to education and an increase in literacy for women worldwide. We pray...
- 5. For the elevation and support of women who have been impacted by economic inequalities, those made more vulnerable to chronic poverty because of gender inequalities in the distribution of income, access to productive inputs such as credit, command over property, or control over earned income, as well as gender biases in labor markets and in trade policies. We pray ...
- 6. For an increased awareness to women's health issues, an emphasis on women in health research, and greater research toward a cure for female cancers. We pray ...
- 7. For an end to human trafficking and the sale of women into the slavery of prostitution, that their human rights may be upheld, and their freedoms protected. We pray ...
- 8. For the adequate protection of incarcerated women from sexual assault, and for restoration of their human rights, especially the rights of mothers in prisons. We pray ...
- 9. That the women and girls in Congo, Darfur, Sudan and around the world may find refuge from the systematic and wide scale murder, rape, torture, abduction and displacement that they face in the violence of war and conflicts. We pray ...
- 10. For the millions of women worldwide affected by the spread of HIV and AIDS. We pray...
- 11. That our law makers will continue their support of women's dignity with appropriate actions such as the renewal of the Violence Against Women Act. We pray ...
- 12. For the protection of those working to respect the dignity of women, that their courageous and generous actions may not be hindered by limitations on freedom of expression or threats of violence. We pray ...
- 13. That the women of Juarez, Mexico and the women in Guatemala will see an end to the murders of women, and for the safety of the hundreds of missing women and for the souls of the murdered. We pray ...
- 14. For these and all the intentions of women in the need of support and solidarity, we pray...

## **Closing Prayer**

LEADER: Mary, model of courage and compassion for women and for men, we pray for gentleness and strength, patience and perseverance, so that with you and your son, Jesus Christ, we may bring forth justice in our world. May you who identify with oppressed women, whose son died a criminal's death and who comforted the grieving, pray that we might be filled with hope and peace. Teach us to celebrate our differences and never to let them be the cause of suffering or harm. Lead us in your way of concern and care, one for another. Pray that we might transform our world into one where women's voices are heard, where women's work is valued, and where families, workplaces, schools and communities nurture equality and mutuality. In the name of your son, Jesus Christ, we pray...
